## We say the Lord's Prayer...

**Readings: Psalm 118 vs. 1,2, 19-29**

**Matthew 21: 1-11**

## Reflection

We probably look at today's lectionary reading and think – I know the story of Palm Sunday and Jesus riding into Jerusalem on a donkey, but let's just think about it, and ask the Lord to show us something new that excites us, and that we can share with others.

As we look at the Scripture reading today, we are reminded that it has been said that if someone was

coming as a conquering king, they would come on a large war horse, showing their strength and great power, but I understand, at the time of Jesus, that kings also came on donkeys, and when that happened, it was a reminder that the King was coming in peace, not declaring war.

**A Conquering King** – As Jesus entered Jerusalem to the sound of praise from 'a very large crowd' (v8), their acclamation of Jesus as the 'Son of David' (v9) indicates clearly that they are viewing Him as none other than the Davidic Messiah, the coming King who would deliver God's people from their enemies – the Romans who occupied their land. There is joy and celebration, seen in their royal homage to Jesus as they strew His way with cloaks and branches, but also a sense of expectation. The crowds recognise the He is not merely 'the prophet from Nazareth in Galilee', a despised area of the country, but in Him is One who comes with God's authority (v9), bringing salvation. Many people were looking for someone who would simply make their lives better, and give them independence, saving them materially and physically. But Jesus had not come as a military, conquering king.

**A Servant King** – Jesus came as a King of a different kind. He came as a Servant King. He did not come to overthrow the Roman occupying force, but to demonstrate the reign and love of God. He would do this by dying on the cross – within days of this triumphal entry. Matthew 20 v28 reads, 'The Son of Man did not come to be served, but to serve, and to give His life as a ransom for many'. This demonstrates that Jesus knew what He was coming to Jerusalem for, and that He was willing to do this.

Although Jesus took the role of a servant, He was actually also a conquering King. Through His death and resurrection, He conquered sin once and for all, setting us free to enter His gates with thankful hearts – Praise the Lord! 'Open for me the gates of righteousness: I will enter and give thanks to the Lord'. (Ps118v19)

Let's just imagine ourselves at the roadside on that day. What would it have been like to welcome Jesus into the city? Would we have been filled with excitement and hopes of freedom, drawn along by

the exuberant atmosphere and shouting of loud 'Hosannas'? I'm sure we would have been on cloud 9 and so sure of Jesus being the 'Son of David', the promised Messiah. BUT.... just a few days later, would we have been in the crowd shouting, "Crucify!"?

Do we stand up for Jesus when the crowd doesn't see Him as Lord and Saviour? Do we speak out for Him in every situation? Do we give Him the honour and glory in every area of our lives? Are we prepared/ able to answer the question 'Who is this?' Is Jesus real in our lives, as the Conquering King and the Servant King?

Spend a few moments thinking about this and searching your heart, praying that we give Jesus the first place in every area of our lives.
